42 ARRESTED ON DRUG CHARGES IN ISABELLA AND OTHER COUNTIES

Forty-two persons were arrested last week on drug charges by State Police narcotics agents. Further arrests were scheduled, according to police reports.

according to police reports.

Among the 42 were persons from Isabella (the bulk of the arrests), Clare Gladwin and Gratiot County.

Marijuana sales were the predominant offense, with harder drugs, such as cocaine, with which Robert D. Kulp of Harrison was charged, among the offenses. LSD also was among the drugs allegedly sold by the defendants.

At least three Weidman-area young men were involved in the raids and arrests.

The Isabella County Sheriff's Department was highly instrumental in the investigations, verifications, and arrests.

State Police and Sheriffs' Department from the other involved counties also aided in the long-term preliminaries to the raids and arrests.




