Friday morning, Aug. 22, at
CMC Hospital, after a very short
stay there. He was 86, one of
our loved and respected pioneers
of Sherman Township.

He was born May 10, 1889, in Sherman Township, and Iived in this area all his life. His farm two miles west of town has been an historic dairy layout until recent years, when he quit the dairy business.

His wife, Deborah, preceded him in death in 1969, after a long illness.

He was a life member of the James A. Cliff Masonic Lodge and the Weidman Oddfellow Lodge. He was a charter member of the Central Michigan Community Hospital Board of Directors, and was Supervisor of Sherman Township for a number of years.

He is survived by one son, Robert Benn, of Broomall, Pa.; two daughters, Mrs. Ronald (Barbara) Carr of Ellenton, Fla., and Mrs. Thomas (Betty) Johnson of Horsehead Lake; six grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren; and one brother, Wilbur Benn, of Weidman; and nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held Monday, Aug. 25, from the Crittenden Funeral Home in Remus, at 1 p. m., with Rev. Strassner of the Remus Church of God officiting. Burial was in the Forest Hill Cemetery.

His death was unexpected in this area, and he will be mourned by many.

WEIDMAN--THE TOWN

to the effect that the town of Weidman should have died two or three times in its history, but each time it seemed to have reached its low point, something popped up to save it.

When John S. Weidman closed down his mills here in 1909, the town should have shriveled up and died; for the Weidman Mills were the sole employer of town residents at that time.

But--by 1909, families had taken up homesteads and bought forties, eighties, and 160s in the area surrounding the town, and their trade at Weidman stores kept the town whizzing along at a prosperous rate--for a number of years.

The grist mill, running on water power, supplied the town with electricity, to a certain extent. About 1927, Consumers Power eyed the village, and Floyd Mitchell sold his electricty rights to them (a franchise) for \$1,000.

(Consumers dribbled their power line down the Air Line Road in 1934 as far as the Roe and Kaninsky places (now James Noe's), providing each family bought an electric stove.

Homes serviced, on the Airline, THAT WOULD NOT DIE
Ragolt Hauck offered a thought, on the occasion of the Open
House at the new bank building,

That affect that the town of homes there were on the Airline

At the peak of John S. Weidman's mills' activities, we had a train in here every day (up to 1912, that we personally remember). After the mills closed the train came in every other day, then once a week, and was finally discontinued in the late 1930s and the track torn up.

With the loss of the railroad, the town of Weidman also lost its Libby pickle station and two potato-shipping houses.

The Holmes Milling Company was a small miller of bread flour and pancake mix that was famous all over the state. Their White Lily bread flour and Log House pancake flour were household staples, not only here but all over Michigan.

By 1950 the pickle factory, potato houses and the flour mill had discontinued their normal business. The mill changed over to electric power from Consumers Company, and there wasn't much of anything one could consider "live" in Weidman.

During the 1950s and 60s, according to Ragolt, the town had lost support of its surrounding area

and was in bad shape.

Floyd Mitchell, president of the privately owned bank here, died in 1949, and state law required the changeover of the bank from private status to "state bank"

"Leon McArthur can be credited with saving the bank at that time," Ragolt said. Leon worked long, long hours at the bank, get ting accounts and papers ready for state inspectors to admit the bank under modern laws.

The first Board of Directors of

State Bank included Homer Campbell of Rosebush, president; A.J. Tilmann, vice president, and Ragolt Hauck vice president; and Joe Stevens, Ray Geasler, Otis Denslow, completing the new Board of Directors for the state bank.

Today the Weidman State Bank is affiliated with the Isabella Bank Bank and Trust of Mt. Pleasant, and is very healthy, indeed.


