SCHOOL BUSES DELAYED MONDAY WITH SUGAR IN THEIR GAS TANKS

Buses at the Weidman school were delayed about an hour Monday morning when it was discovered that sugar had been poured into the gas tanks of seven buses.

One bus was free of the stuff, and it and two borrowed buses from other towns got the kids to school about an hour late.

The mess was discovered when one of the bus drivers started to plumbers and furnace men get

\$10 an hour for their work. We were mistaken. They get \$18.50 per hour. fill his tank with gas and noticed sugar spilled over the opening. Immediately all buses were checked, with one escaping the outrage.

Drivers drained all gas tanks and flushed them out and refilled and went back on the road.

A section of the playground also was torn up by a car or cars digging deep into grass and sand.

Sheriff's officers identified positively one 16-year-old, with the pickup of another appearing imminent as we went to press. Weidman School Principal Harry Howard said Tuesday morning that the two boys "are not the kind of kids you'd normally expect to do such a thing." The Sheriff Department's detective was still at work here Tuesday.

Three hundred and sixty gallons of gas were dumped out of the affected buses, and the tanks flushed and cleaned. Sheriff's officers indicated this probably would mean a charge of malicious destruction of over a hundred dollars' worth, constituting a felony. Names of the boys were not released by the Sheriff's department, according to state law regarding minors in trouble. The school was "back to normal" Tuesday morning.




